

## 2. Chairman's Statement.


The Chairman presented the following statement to the meeting:-

But sadly today, we must say goodbye to Roger Waltham, David Tyler, Charles Pottle, John Andrews and [later after the end of the present financial year] Charles Byford. After many years of sterling service, they feel that it is time for a rest and move onto other pursuits. I would therefore like to sincerely thank them on behalf of the Province of East Kent, the Trustees of the Museum and Library and the Association of Patrons and everyone here today, for their contribution and service to the Museum and Library.

My introduction this morning is therefore based on the theme of 'Inventing the Future'. Today we will officially be appointing a new team who will now be responsible for this next chapter in the history of the Museum and Library.

The Museum and Library contains an excellent record of the past but now we must look at what the future means, indeed what it should look like and how do we get there. This is our journey together. Having now reopened the Museum and Library following the forced closure due to the pandemic, there are now many challenges ahead of us, but this makes life very exciting. Today I invite you to be part of this exciting journey and join with us on 'Inventing the Future'.

I am not going to stand here today to outline our approach together with the future plan that we are considering but instead we will provide a series of updates to you all throughout the year. Having said that we have just drafted our 5 year plan and when signed off after Christmas, this will be circulated to you all.

I would now just like to emphasise the importance of the role of Lodge Ambassadors. You are the face to face salesmen of the Museum and Library and without your sales pitch, we cannot sell our product, that being the Museum and Library.

If we are to grow the membership of the Association of Patrons, we need to create the reasons for individuals, Lodges and Chapters to sign up. That said, in doing this, we need to increase our sales pitch and we will support you in how to do so. One of our key ambitions is to replace the gas central heating with full air conditioning, a far better system for the longevity of the artifacts in the museum, some of which are very rare and of international importance and the books in the library, again a rare collection and of great importance. To achieve this ambition, we need to increase our income and we can achieve this by working as 'one team'.

To conclude, the Museum and Library is a jewel in the crown of Freemasonry here in Kent which captures many years of our local history, the history of Kent, the history of the UK and many places across the world.

We need to continue to preserve this unique and important facility and in doing so, together we must invent the future going forwards to ensure that we continue to tell our story.

## 5. Resignation and Election of Trustees

## 8. Report of the Chairman of the Association of Patrons

It is my pleasure to offer this report on the activities of the Association of Patrons (Association of Patrons) since our last AGM in 2021.

As is customary, I extend a most sincere thank you to all our Patrons. Without your ongoing support the Kent Museum of Freemasonry could not operate and the work of the Association of Patrons is vital to secure a successful future. I am very grateful to all those on the Association of Patrons team for their continued commitment which has ensured another record year in terms of income and new patronages.

With regard to Patrons and Patron Income, during the financial year 2021-22

- Total Association of Patrons income (inc Gift Aid) was £15,691.00. Another record high.
- This year we achieved an uplift of 34 new Patronages. Another year of strong growth, especially given the Museum had not yet reopened.
- We currently have 342 active (paid-up) Patrons.

Our in-house magazine, "Museum Matters" continues to be very popular. W. Bro James Burchell has now taken over the reigns and is to be congratulated for all his work. It is a most important way we can engage with our Patrons. We are always looking for support and ideas so please get in touch.

The Deputy Provincial Grand Master addressed the meeting.


Mr Chairman, Ladies, Gentlemen and Brethren.

The Provincial Grand Master has asked me to thank you Mr Chairman and your team for the big push to open the doors, the hard work that has been done to achieve that and the hard work that continues to be done to keep the Museum operating and an interesting place to visit.

In so doing that, the Provincial Grand Master has also requested that I make public his grateful thanks to the past Chairman Worshipful Brother Roger Waltham and those members of his team that have stepped down earlier this year.

In particular I would like to mention the now past Secretary John Andrews for his dedication and service over some 15 years. He has really been a stalwart and conscientious member of the team.

As a past Provincial Secretary, I know only too well that the Secretary drives the engine room and everything ends up on his desk, so thank you again John.

The Kent Museum and Library here in Canterbury is a fantastic asset to both the Provinces of East and West Kent and is considered by most to be number 2 in England and Wales, second only to the Museum at Great Queen Street, and one that many other Provinces are envious of.

I must stress the point that it is the Kent Museum and Library, and we should be very active in encouraging more support from West Kent, both in volunteers and patrons.

I do know that we have a new Chairmen of the Association of Patrons Worshipful Brother Graham Barrett a West Kent Mason, and I'm sure he will be looking to promote patronage from across both Provinces, and I'm also sure more awareness, especially in West Kent, will pay dividends moving forward.

He will be ably assisted in this task by the new Deputy Chairman Neville Fourie. Also, Mr Chairman, as you mentioned in your opening remarks, that you and your team are already looking at ways to encourage and utilise the Lodge Ambassadors who do have such an important role to play in promoting the Museum at Lodge level.

They are an important conduit to be used in encouraging members to visit with Family and Friends or days out for Lodge members. More activity in this direction can only be of benefit to us all as it promotes our Fraternity.

Being number two it was no surprise to be told of some of the remarkable exhibits which the Museum holds. Two at least of most interest that have recently been found in storage and were not on show before, although I'm sure they will be now if not already.

Firstly, a heavy maul which the British Museum has confirmed as being from between the years 3,500 to 2,500 BC and comes from a tomb in the Valley of the Kings in Luxor, Egypt. I think I'm correct in saying that there is only one other similar to this one in the Country and which is now registered at the British Museum.

Secondly, we have a first edition copy of the Anderson Constitutions dated 1723 and three other editions that were published between 1784 and 1896.

The Anderson Constitutions for those that don't know were written by James Anderson, a Presbyterian clergyman in 1723, so you can see we have an original. He was commissioned to do this by John Desaguliers who was the third Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of England.

These Constitutions are the basis of which modern Freemasonry is founded on, and it is truly remarkable therefore that not only a first edition is here at Canterbury but three other further editions.

A couple of interesting footnotes, you are probably all aware that Grand Lodge are celebrating the tercentenary of the publication of the Anderson Constitutions in 1723 with a special meeting in January 2023 and other events planned across England, America, and Europe.
